

Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 has put a major spotlight on the vital importance of the Black Sea. The region is at the intersection of key security threats with the ongoing war nearby, crucial maritime challenges with the grain crisis, and ensuring energy alternatives to Russian gas.

H.E. Andrei Muraru, Ambassador of Romania to the United States, and H.E. Join American University's Meltzer Schwartzberg Center for Israel Studies for an afternoon of fiction and personal stories from bestselling author and international phenomenon Etgar Keret. Published in 46 countries and translated into 41 languages, Keret has won numerous awards for his fiction, as well as the 2016 Charles Bronfman Prize for humanitarian work. Keret's newest book of stories, Fly Already, won the prestigious Sapir Prize. There will be a reception and book sale and signing after the talk.
