

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## Teach a Summer Course at OLLI!



If you are passionate about a topic, we invite you to share your talents by leading an OLLI at AU course (or study group, as we call them). We are currently accepting June and July study group proposals from within the OLLI membership, the Washington, DC community, and thanks to Zoom, from those outside of the area as well. With the shorter sessions, the summer is a great time

to get started at OLLI and "dip your toe" in the teaching waters!

### **A Few OLLI Teaching Basics**

- Class formats and lengths are flexible. You can teach in-person or online, from twosessions to a full 10-week study group. Each class session is 90 minutes during one of three time slots (9:45 AM, 11:45 AM, or 1:45 PM).
- OLLI is primarily a volunteer-led organization and instructors (study group leaders) teach on a volunteer basis. SGLs can take free classes during either the session in which they teach or the following comparable session. They are also provided a parking stipend, given recognition at OLLI's study group leader luncheon, and have access to AU's Bender Library.
- OLLI has three types of academic programming:
   Fall (Sept-Dec) and Spring (late Feb-May)—study groups meet once a week for 7-10 weeks
   February Shorts and July Shorts—study groups meet 2-5 times over the course of one week
   June Minis—study groups meet once a week for 4 weeks
- A study group leader orientation is offered to new SGLs before they teach for the first time. It's a two-hour session offered online and led by OLLI staff and current SGLs.

#### Who Teaches at OLLI at AU?

Our teaching ranks include active and retired academics, doctors, lawyers, teachers, psychologists, AU professors, and more—all with an amazing range of experience and backgrounds. Our unique learning community sets our program apart for many who lead study groups. Members bring their diverse life experience to the classroom for an invigorating learning environment. It is learning for the simple joy of learning with no tests or grades.

#### **Develop Your Own Course**

Subject areas include: Politics, Law, and Government; Psychology, Sociology, and Culture; Economics and Personal Finance; STEM (Science, Tech, Engineering, and Math); Arts and Music; Language and Literature; History and Geography; and Philosophy and Religion. **Explore past courses and catalogs for ideas. Talk with a Curriculum Committee member in charge of your area of interest. Try a short course. John A. Lawrence, Arc of Power: Inside Nancy Pelosi's Speakership, 2005-2010

How did she do it? Nancy Pelosi was arguably the most consequential Speaker of the House since Sam Rayburn. From his perspective as her Chief of Staff during her first period as Speaker, John Lawrence will tell us about her "Arc of Power."

After serving for 30 years as a senior staff member in the U.S. House of Representatives, **John A. Lawrence** was the Chief of Staff to Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) for eight years including her first term as Speaker. He previously served as staff director of the Committee on Education and the Workforce and the Committee on Natural Resources, as well as chief of staff and legislative director to Congressman George Miller (D-Calif.). Upon Mr. Lawrence's retirement in February 2013, Speakers John A. Boehner and Nancy Pelosi recognized his dedication to the House and to bipartisanship by conferring on him the John W. McCormack Award for Excellence. He currently is a visiting professor at the University of California (Washington Campus), and also teaches at the McCourt School for Public Policy at Georgetown University. He has lectured at Princeton's Wilson School of Public Policy, the Eagleton Institute for Public Policy at Rutgers, Columbia University, Oberlin College and other institutions. He blogs on Congress and public affairs at **DOMEocracy**. His book about the former Speaker, *Arc of Power: Inside Nancy Pelosi's Speakership, 2005-1010*, is available at Politics and Prose.

#### Still Time to Register

#### **Spring Catalog Changes**

Class changes can be viewed on the <u>Spring Catalog Changes</u> page on the website, located under Classes, then Semesters/Minis. Any changes are updated there immediately.

#### **Parking**

In accordance with American University's Good Neighbor policy, members are required to park in the Spring Valley Building garage when attending OLLI classes or events. #### **Hearing Loops**

All of the classrooms at OLLI have hearing loops installed. "Hearing loops" are state-of-the-art "Listening Assistive" technology. There are three main parts to a hearing loop: the wire that is installed around and across the room, a microphone, and a transceiver (which picks up and amplifies the sound from the microphone). The system both amplifies the speaker's voice and suppresses background noise.

We urge everyone who has hearing loss to take advantage of the hearing loops. The sound is remarkable. It's as if the person speaking is sitting right next to you. View detailed information.

### **Keep Zoom Up-to-Date**

Please be sure Zoom is up-to-date on your device before the start of your online class. Users on **Apple devices must be on at least iOS 11** and **Android users must be on at least Android 6** to continue to receive Zoom updates. You can update and download Zoom <a href="here">here</a>. Please note that if Zoom is up-to-date on your device, the icon is no longer a camera, but a blue circle that says, "Zoom" (see image below).




#### **Access Your Online Class**

If you accidentally delete the daily e-mail with your class Zoom link, or cannot find it again, you can access the Zoom link for each of your classes by logging into your OLLI member account on the <a href="website">website</a>. The first page to come up will be your account page, which lists your classes (see image below). Under each class you will find the Zoom link for that class. Click the link to go into your class

at the specified time. If you leave this page and need to get back, simply click your name (hyperlinked in blue) at the top of the page. <u>View a video tutorial.</u>

# Access Class Recordings

Most online classes are recorded. One of the benefits of taking classes during a particular session is access to all class recordings for that session. **Spring recordings** are listed under Classes, then Semesters/Minis on the OLLI website (see the image below). Each day's recordings are added to the website by 5:00 PM. You must first **log into your member account** in order to view the recordings. **Recordings are available for viewing up until two weeks past the end of each session.** 



# National Portrait Gallery Study

The National Portrait Gallery is involved in a study that looks at the ways people with different levels of sight experience audio description. As part of the study, we are looking for volunteers to take part in some online research. We need participants who are blind, partially-blind, low-vision or sighted; who are art lovers, or who have no interest in art at all, or who fall somewhere in between. The study takes approximately 1 hour, and we are able to offer a thank you voucher of \$10.

This is a collaborative UK/US project, funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council, run by Alison Eardley (University of Westminster), in partnership with the National Portrait Gallery (US), Access Smithsonian (US), the Watts Gallery and Artists Village (UK), VocalEyes (UK), Smartify, Royal Holloway, University of London and the University of Westminster.
