FALL SEMESTER REMINDERS: REGISTRATION

The **fall semester begins on Tuesday, September 26,** but there is still plenty of time to register or add another class! You can see the status of each (open or closed) on the OLLI website. The membership fee (\$300 for the semester or \$550 for both fall and spring) allows you to sign up for three courses before the lottery. Now that the lottery has passed, you can add a **fourth study group** by logging into your account. Please note that whether a class is recorded is subject to change based on SGL preferences and office capacity. The deadline to add/drop classes and request a refund is **Friday, October 6**.

Please make sure to **attend your registered classes** and arrive **on time** each day, as SGLs spend a prodigious amount of time preparing their classes for members.

HEARING LOOPS

All of the classrooms at OLLI have "hearing loops" installed, which are state-of-the-art "Listening Assistive" technology. There are three main parts to a hearing loop: the wire that is installed around and across the room, a microphone, and a transceiver (which picks up and amplifies the sound from the microphone). The system both amplifies the speaker's voice and suppresses background noise.

We urge everyone who has hearing loss to take advantage of the hearing loops. The sound is remarkable. It's as if the person speaking is sitting right next to you.

ACCESS YOUR ONLINE CLASS

If you accidentally delete the daily e-mail with your class Zoom link, or cannot find it again, you can access the Zoom link for each of your classes by logging into your OLLI member account on the **website**. The first page to come up will be your account page, which lists your classes. Under each class you will find the Zoom link for that class. Click the link to go into your class at the specified time. If you leave this page and need to get back, simply click your name (hyperlinked in blue) at the top of the page. For more tips and instructions on how to use Zoom, click **here**.

VIDEO TUTORIAL

KEEP ZOOM UP TO DATE

Please be sure **Zoom is up-to-date** on your device **before the start of your online class**. Zoom enforces their lifecycle policy every three months. You will not be able to log into your online class if it is not updated. You can update and download Zoom <u>here</u>.

ACCESS CLASS RECORDINGS

Many classes of all formats are being recorded. One of the benefits of taking classes during a particular session is access to all class recordings for that session. <u>Fall recordings</u> are listed under Classes, then Semesters/Minis on the OLLI website (see the image below). Each day's recordings are added to the website the following business day. You must first <u>log into your member account</u> in order to view the recordings. Recordings are available for viewing up until two weeks past the end of each session.

What our volunteers do:

Volunteers meet regularly with a child in detention to form a connection and get to know their story.

Volunteers then collaborate directly with attorneys and social workers to determine the best interests of the children and to advocate for those interests.
