REGISTRATION IS OPEN!

The February Shorts and spring semester registration is open! OLLI is continuing to offer classes in three formats: **in-person**, **online**, and **hybrid**. The format for each course is listed online and in the print catalog. When registering for a hybrid class, you must select whether you want to attend in-person (hybrid in-person) or online (hybrid online). List both formats if the class is a priority and you're willing to attend either format. You can prioritize up to 12 classes for the lottery. As always, the lottery will then assign you to up to three classes.

FEBRUARY SHORTS

The February Shorts will be held for two weeks: February 5-9 and 12-16. Each Short course runs for 2-5 days during one of the two weeks. You may register for up to three courses in the lottery for the \$100 fee. Your courses do not have to be all within the same week. After the lottery, once you receive your class assignment letter, you can add additional courses—as many open courses as fit in your schedule—by logging into your OLLI account! To take more courses, you can even stack several within the same time slot. For example, if you have a course scheduled for February 5-7 (Mon-Wed) at 11:45 AM, you can add another that meets February 8-9 (Thu-Fri), also at 11:45 AM, instead of having to choose between the two.

Make sure to register before the February Shorts lottery on Thursday, January 18.

VIEW CLASSES AND REGISTER

SPRING SEMESTER

The spring semester is March 4–May 10. Courses meet for a varying length of time (see each study group for the number of weeks). The membership fee remains \$300 and hasn't been increased since fall 2017; the fee allows you to sign up for three courses in the lottery. After the lottery, when you have received your class assignment letter, you can add a **fourth study group** by logging into your account.

Make sure to register before the spring lottery on Tuesday, February 20.

Keith Wiley, *Demographic Change, Economic Distress, and Uncertain Times: A Closer Look at the Data*

Keith Wiley, Senior Research Associate at the Housing Assistance Council, is a main author of Taking Stock, HAC's report on poverty in the US. He has worked extensively with many datasets in an effort to better understand where, when, and how development patterns occur. As part of these efforts. Keith has authored a recent article in the Journal of Housing Policy Debate, entitled "The Role of the CDBG Program in Rural America" and has written several reports analyzing rural lending activities. He also coauthored both a book chapter in The Oxford Handbook of Urban Economics and Planning and a "Resources for the Future" discussion paper exploring residential infill. Keith holds a master's degree in public policy from American University and a PhD in Public Policy from the University of Maryland-Baltimore County.



Maureen Corrigan, *Banned in the USA*Friday, January 19 | 10:00-11:00 AM Online

Maureen Corrigan is The Nicky and Jamie Grant
Distinguished Professor of the Practice in Literary
Criticism at Georgetown University. She is an
associate editor of and contributor to *Mystery and Suspense Writers* (Scribner) and the winner of the
1999 Edgar Award for Criticism, presented by the
Mystery Writers of America. In 2019, Corrigan was

awarded the Nona Balakian Citation for Excellence in Reviewing by the National Book Critics Circle.

Corrigan served as a juror for the 2012 Pulitzer Prize in Fiction. She is the author of *So We Read On: How the Great Gatsby Came To Be and Why It Endures* (Little, Brown, 2014). Corrigan's literary memoir, *Leave Me Alone, I'm Reading!* was published in 2005. Corrigan is also a reviewer and columnist for National Public Radio and *The Washington Post*. In addition to serving on the advisory panel of *The American Heritage Dictionary*, she has chaired the Mystery and Suspense judges' panel of the *Los Angeles Times* Book Prize.

Born in Donetsk, Ukraine when it was part of the USSR, Mr. Sharansky was a leading Soviet dissident and Human Rights activist.

He was imprisoned by the Soviets and sentenced to thirteen years of forced labor. Following a series of hunger strikes while in prison, and an international Human Rights campaign to win his freedom, he was released in 1986 in an international prisoner exchange. After his release he moved to Israel, was involved in the Human Rights campaign that helped facilitate the collapse of the Soviet Union, served in the Israeli Knesset and was twice a Minister in the Government of Israel.

An author of three books, Mr. Sharansky will speak about the "Challenges of the Free World in Ukraine, Russia, and the Middle East."
