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NOMINATIONS FOR OLLI'S BOARD OF DIRECTORS

In April, OLLI members will elect four members to the OLLI Board of Directors. The Nominating and Elections Committee will prepare a slate of nominees for Board approval that will be placed on the general election ballot for the membership to consider

The committee welcomes recommendations from the membership identifying potential nominees, including oneself. Directors are elected for one three-year term, with the opportunity to run for a second consecutive term.

When considering a recommendation, please keep in mind the expectations for OLLI Board Members. Directors are expected to make every effort to attend Board meetings and are expected to support OLLI's development efforts. Ours is a working Board of Directors; in addition to their participation at Board meetings, members are also expected to participate in other OLLI activities, e.g., SGL Luncheons, Town Halls, and the Annual Meeting. During the duration of their term, Directors must retain their OLLI membership. Board members may serve as Chairs of Committees, although this is not required. Committee membership is, however, strongly encouraged.

To submit a recommendation, please provide the name of the individual along with one or two paragraphs (not more) on the person's background, OLLI involvement, and your reasons for recommending them. Please send these written recommendations to olli@american.edu no later than Friday, March 1.
Announcement of the nominees selected and approved by the Board will be presented in the OLLI Newsletter. To self-nominate and run as an "at-large" candidate, please submit a petition that includes the signature of a minimum of ten OLLI members by Friday, April 5.. The OLLI offices will provide petition forms and instructions to anyone wishing to self-nominate.

Hearing Loops

All of the classrooms at OLLI have hearing loops installed. "Hearing loops" are state-of-the-art "Listening Assistive" technology. The system both amplifies the speaker's voice and suppresses background noise. We urge everyone who has hearing loss to take advantage of the hearing loops. The sound is remarkable. It's as if the person speaking is sitting right next to you. View detailed information.



Access Your Online Class

If you accidentally delete the daily e-mail with your class Zoom link, or cannot find it again, you can access the Zoom link for each of your classes by logging into your OLLI member account on the **website**. The first page to come up will be your account page, which lists your classes (see image below). Under each class you will find the Zoom link for that class. Click the link to go into your class at the specified time. If you leave this page and need to get back, simply click your name (hyperlinked in blue) at the top of the page. **View a video tutorial.**

Keep Your Zoom Up to Date

Please be sure Zoom is up-to-date on your device before the start of your online class. Zoom's lifecycle policy took effect on Saturday, February 3, so if you did not update Zoom before then, you will be unable to join your class. You can update and download Zoom here.

ACCESS CLASS HANDOUTS & RECORDINGS

Most classes during the February Shorts and spring semester will be recorded. One of the benefits of taking classes during a particular session is access to all class recordings for that session. February Shorts recordings, as well as February Shorts handouts, are listed under "Classes," then "Shorts" on the OLLI website (see image below). Spring recordings and handouts will be listed under "Classes," then "Semesters/Minis." Each day's recordings during the Shorts are added the same day. You must first log in to your member account in order to view the recordings. Recordings are available for viewing up until two weeks past the end of each session.



SPRING SEMESTER

The spring semester is March 4-May 10. Courses meet for a varying length of time (see each study group for the number of weeks). The membership fee remains \$300 and hasn't been increased since fall 2017; the fee allows you to sign up for three courses in the lottery. After the lottery, once you have received your class assignment letter, you can add a **fourth study group** by logging into your account.

Make sure to register before the spring lottery on Tuesday, February 20.

A Few OLLI Teaching Basics

- Class formats and lengths are flexible. You can teach in-person or online, from two sessions to a full 10-week study group. Each class session is 90 minutes during one of three time slots (9:45 AM, 11:45 AM, or 1:45 PM).
- OLLI is primarily a volunteer-led organization and instructors (study group leaders) teach on a volunteer basis. SGLs can take free classes during either the session in which they teach or the following comparable session. They are also provided a parking stipend, given recognition at OLLI's study group leader luncheon, and have access to AU's Bender Library.
- OLLI has three types of academic programming:

Fall (Sept-Dec) and **Spring** (Mar-May)—study groups meet once a week for 7-10 weeks

February Shorts and **July Shorts**—study groups meet 2-5 times over the course of one week

June Minis—study groups meet once a week for 4 weeks

A study group leader orientation is offered to new SGLs before they teach
for the first time. It's a 90-minute session offered online and led by OLLI staff
and current SGLs.

Who Teaches at OLLI at AU?

Our teaching ranks include active and retired academics, doctors, lawyers, teachers, psychologists, AU professors, and more—all with an amazing range of experience and backgrounds. Our unique learning community sets our program apart for many who lead study groups. Members bring their diverse life experience to the classroom for an invigorating learning environment. It is learning for the simple joy of learning with no tests or grades.

Are you interested in volunteering with OLLI from the comfort of your own home? Become an SGR Coordinator for the spring semester! are no volunteers. Coordinators then call members before classes start in order to find an SGR for each study group. For the upcoming academic sessions, SGR Coordinators will begin making calls after the lottery.
