
World War II Memorial project. He has been with the Commission since August 1996, a few months after retiring from the United States Air Force.

Why Read or (Reread) Henry James's Most Difficult Novel, *The Golden Bowl?*Tuesday, April 9 | 9:45-10:45 AM

This brief talk will try to arouse interest in this not easily-read novel of James's "late" period, by exploring the strange, even perverse, relationship of a wealthy father and daughter who both marry but who never succeed in separating themselves from one another, thus all but creating the conditions for their own betrayal—the adultery—at the heart of the novel.

Michael W. Farrell is a former chair of the English department at Georgetown Preparatory School and an appellate judge for 30 years. He is a lifelong reader of Henry James.

Peter Baker is the chief White House correspondent for *The New York Times* covering President Biden and his administration. Baker joined *The Times* in 2008 after 20 years at *The Washington Post* and has covered the past five presidents, starting in 1996 with Bill Clinton and continuing through George W. Bush, Barack Obama, Donald J. Trump, and now Joe Biden. He is the author of seven books, most recently *The Divider: Trump in the White House, 2017-2021*, with his wife, Susan B. Glasser.

Susan B. Glasser is a staff writer at *The New Yorker*, where she writes a weekly column on life in Washington. Glasser has served as the top editor of several Washington publications, including *Politico*, where she founded the awardwinning *Politico Magazine*, and *Foreign Policy*, which won three National Magazine Awards, among other honors, during her tenure as editor in chief. Before that, she

worked for a decade at the *Washington Post*, where she was the editor of Outlook and national news. Her most recent book is **The Divider**, a best-selling history of Donald Trump in the White House, which she co-wrote with her husband, Peter Baker.

AU Professor and Senior Editor and Correspondent on the Washington Desk for NPR News Ron Elving will moderate this event. A reception will be held after the event.

This conversation is part of the Thurber Dialogues on Democracy, an ongoing series of conversations with prominent thought leaders about how to strengthen democracy in the US and abroad, which began in early 2021 with a generous gift from Distinguished University Emeritus Professor Jim Thurber and his wife Claudia Thurber.
