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Letter From the Chair: Changing of the Guard



June is a time of transition for OLLI at AU. For the past year, I have had the honor and privilege of serving as Board Chair. It has been an enormously rewarding experience to work with other members of the Board, with Executive Director Tony Long, Deputy Executive Director Mary Fran Miklitsch and the rest of our talented staff, the committee chairs, and other volunteers. But it is now time to step down. Next week, Vice Chair Dave Hensler takes over as Chair. Dave brings extensive experience as a leader and a strong commitment to OLLI's success. Currently a Senior Counsel at Hogan Lovells US LLP, he is a former member of the Board of Directors of the Duke Ellington Fund and is a Trustee and the Treasurer of the Foundation of the American College of Trial Lawyers. Dave is also the outside General Counsel, on a pro bono basis, for the largest Native American scholarship fund. He played a pivotal role in getting a substantial increase in our annual payment from the AU Endowment and in improving the investment return on OLLI's investment account. And, as Chair of the Strategic Planning Committee, he led in developing new initiatives aimed at increasing diversity and enrollment and establishing a permanent digital library. Clearly, we will be in good hands with Dave.

June is also when we welcome new members to the Board and bid farewell to those departing. We welcome newly elected Linda Miller and Penny Hansen. Penny was elected for a full term after serving out the term of a Board member who departed early. Joining Linda and Penny are John Aldock and Mark Nadel, both of whom have been re-elected for second terms. Linda is a past Board member and Chair who is returning to active service. Both Penny and Mark are popular Study Group Leaders, and Mark coordinates our highly successful Friday Lecture Series. Along with Dave, John played a key role in discussions with the University to increase the Endowment distribution. All bring a wealth of skills, experience, and devotion to OLLI.

But June is also a time of departure. We bid a fond, but sad, farewell to Myra Barron, who steps down after two terms on the Board, including one year as Chair. Myra has also been a mainstay in our successful effort to strengthen and deepen our relationship with AU. There hasn't been an OLLI Board meeting in the past seven years where Myra wasn't present. We will miss her wise counsel and steady hand.

Going forward, this is an exciting time for OLLI at AU. We have weathered the pandemic and have come out stronger than ever. While the great majority of OLLIs have struggled mightily, losing about a third of their members on average, we are part of a very small group that maintained or even increased enrollment. From the outset, we never flinched, making the right decisions quickly and early on. It was a true team effort: the Board, the staff, our Study Group Leaders, other volunteers, and you. Particularly you. You stayed the course, even when we moved to remote learning where few of us had any experience and a far cry from the close-knit community we signed up for. Our loyal donor community also responded strongly, with 24 percent – an all-time high (versus 14 percent for OLLIs nationally) – contributing to our Friends of OLLI Fund and breaking all previous fundraising efforts.

We are not the same OLLI as two years ago. Zoom has changed us forever. And we are using it to make us stronger. Space limitations for popular classes or lectures are largely a thing of the past. Miss a class or want to check another class? Watch the recording. Want to view an OLLI classic from the past? Check our Permanent Digital Library. Want to schedule a Friday lecturer from outside the Washington area? We can do that. Finally, have mobility issues and find it difficult to get to the building? Participate from home.

Meanwhile, and perhaps most exciting, we are on track to return to robust in-person programming, the glue that pulls us together as a community and which has sustained us over the years. We are not fully back but are making great progress. Just last week, some 70 of us gathered in-person for an SGL appreciation luncheon. It was our largest in-person gathering in more than two years. Such energy and such fun were had just being together. One member said it was like having a triple espresso after two years of no coffee. Keep your cups handy. There is more coming.

Looking ahead, this coming fall will mark our 40th anniversary. Plans are underway for a proper celebration. And we will have much to celebrate. We have come a long way since that first semester when we offered 12 courses to some 80 members. We are also well positioned to achieve even more thanks to our extraordinary members and leadership team.

Be well, be safe, and, to the maximum extent possible, be in-person. See you in class.
