

AU Mask Policy Reminder

As of August 11, 2022, masks are required in classrooms to support the continuity of the learning experience, but are not required in public spaces. Thus, in accordance with AU policy, masks will be required in the classroom for OLLI's fall semester. Masks will be optional in the social space.

SGLs can remove masks while lecturing if there is sufficient distance (generally six feet) between them and their class members. Eating in the classroom remains prohibited, but SGLs and participants may briefly raise their masks to drink.

If you are attending a class in-person and did not attest to your Covid-19 vaccination/booster during the registration process (those who registered online between July 8 and July 28), you will be

required to fill out an attestation form, which were sent out this morning.

Registration will remain open on the OLLI website until **Friday, September 30** for any classes with space still available. To add a fourth class now that the lottery has passed, you do not need to contact the office-simply log into your account on the website. The deadline for class changes and refund requests is also **Friday, September 30**.

Fall Books

As usual, OLLI is working with Politics and Prose for books this fall. To purchase books for classes, members can do any of the following:

- Order from their website
- Call (202)-364-1919 to order over the phone
- Visit Politics and Prose in person at 5015 Connecticut Ave NW

If purchasing books via their website, mention in the notes field that the book is for an OLLI course. Their web orders team will apply the 10% discount to your credit card when it's officially processed. If you call or shop in person, mention the discount when paying. Politics and Prose encourages online orders over phone orders, as the phone lines can have long wait times. Another source for supporting independent bookstores is www.indiebound.org, which lists all independent bookstores by zip code. View books that are not available, pay-to-order, or without the discount.

Update Zoom on Your Device

If you are taking an online class, please be sure Zoom is up-to-date on your device before the start of classes. You can update and download Zoom here. If it is not updated by November, you will be unable to join meetings.

Making Changes to Your Registration

If you would like to add or drop classes, you may do so through your member account on the **OLLI website**. Once you log in, click on your name highlighted in blue on the top right corner of the screen. There you will see all of your classes; select "Add a study group" to add another class or

select "Drop this class" next to the class you would like to drop. The deadline to add or drop classes is **Friday, September 30.**

Maya MacGuineas, *Just How Bad is the Federal Budget Situation?*Friday, September 23

Maya MacGuineas is the president of the bipartisan Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget. Her areas of expertise include budget, tax, and economic policy. As a leading budget expert and a political independent, she has worked closely with members of both parties and serves as a trusted resource on Capitol Hill. MacGuineas testifies regularly before Congress and has published broadly, including regularly in *The Washington Post, The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times, The Financial Times, The Atlantic*, and numerous other outlets. She also appears regularly as a commentator on television.

MacGuineas oversees a number of the Committee's projects, including the grassroots coalition Fix the Debt; the Committee's Fiscal Institute; and FixUS, a project seeking to better understand the root causes of our nation's growing divisions and deteriorating political system, and to work with others to bring attention to these issues and the need to fix them. Her most recent area of focus is on the future of the economy, technology, and capitalism.

Previously, MacGuineas worked at the Brookings Institution and on Wall Street, and in the spring of 2009 she did a stint on *The Washington Post* editorial board, covering economic and fiscal policy. MacGuineas serves on a number of boards and is a native Washingtonian.

Serendipity! Talk

Judy Ikels, *Death in Wartime China, A Daughter's Discovery*Monday, October 3

On the 75th Anniversary of the end of WWII, I wanted to share the story of my father, William H. (Bill) Wallace, Jr, a B-24 pilot who sacrificed his life redeeming his entire crew in 1944. He served in the China-Burma-India Theater with the Army Air Corps 308th Bombardment Group in the direct military lineage of the famed Flying Tigers. He died before I was born. I learned in 2015, somewhat by

accident, a monument had been erected in 2006 to honor Bill and Chinese-American friendship near Kunming, China. In 2016, I made an emotional journey to visit the memorial. Death in Wartime China, A Daughter's Discovery weaves together firsthand accounts from an almost forgotten theater of war and a modern journey of re-connection and reflection.

Judy Ikels, a native Texan and graduate of the University of Texas majoring in English and Spanish, completed a 28-year Civil Service career with the Department of State in 2018. She had accompanied her late husband Larry Ikels on his 31-year career as a Foreign Service Officer with the US Information Agency serving in El Salvador, Colombia, Venezuela, Mexico, Brazil and Greece.

The story about her father's heroism and sacrifice in WWII lingered in the back of her mind all her life. But a serendipitous encounter in 2015 led her to a meaningful trip to China to see first-hand a memorial erected to honor her father and Chinese-American friendship. Family archives, letters, photos, and research taught her more.

Judy's unique story first appeared in the May, 2016 edition of State Magazine, the official publication of the Department of State, under the title "Discovering a Legacy." Death in Wartime China: A Daughter's Discovery is a heartfelt memoir that throws a spotlight on a little-known theater of WWII and the brave young Americans who served there. It is a reminder that family history shapes us in ways large and small.
