Parking Reminder

If you are attending an in-person class or OLLI event, you are required to park in the garage beneath the Spring Valley Building. Parking is \$2/hour. You may pay through the kiosk or download the **PayByPhone** app. We recommend downloading the app and registering before coming to class. Recorded Classes

Fall members may access all recorded classes through **Friday, December 16**, by logging on (with your username and password) to the **OLLI website**. Once logged on, click on the **Classes** tab across the top. Next, scroll down and click on **Semesters/Minis**, then **Fall 2022 Recordings**. This will bring you to the recordings page, organized by each day. Click on the day your class meets to find the recordings arranged by class time.

Zoom Tips

As we head into the second week of the fall semester, here are some tips to ensure a smooth experience over Zoom:

- If you have trouble hearing, turn the **volume up on your computer** (this function is typically found somewhere in the bottom right corner of your screen and/or on your keyboard)
- If people cannot hear you, go to the tool bar, click the up arrow next to the microphone icon, and **select a different microphone**
- If you did not see an email with the Zoom link to your class, **log into your account** on the website

Making Changes to Your Registration

If you would like to add or drop classes, you may do so through your member account on the <u>OLLI</u> <u>website</u>. Once you **log in**, click on your name highlighted in blue on the top right corner of the screen. Maya MacGuineas is the president of the bipartisan Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget. Her areas of expertise include budget, tax, and economic policy. As a leading budget expert and a political independent, she has worked closely with members of both parties and serves as a trusted resource on Capitol Hill. MacGuineas testifies regularly before Congress and has published broadly, including regularly in *The Washington Post, The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times, The Financial Times, The Atlantic*, and numerous other outlets. She also appears regularly as a

MacGuineas oversees a number of the Committee's projects, including the grassroots coalition Fix the Debt; the Committee's Fiscal Institute; and FixUS, a project seeking to better understand the root causes of our nation's growing divisions and deteriorating political system, and to work with others to bring attention to these issues and the need to fix them. Her most recent area of focus is on the future of the economy, technology, and capitalism.

Previously, MacGuineas worked at the Brookings Institution and on Wall Street, and in the spring of 2009 she did a stint on *The Washington Post* editorial board, covering economic and fiscal policy.

MacGuineas serves on a number of boards and is a native Washingtonian.

Juliette Kayyem, *The Devil Never Sleeps: Learning to Live in an Age of Disasters*Friday, September 30

Professor Juliette Kayyem is currently the faculty chair of the Homeland Security and Security and Global Health Projects at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. She also serves as a national security analyst for CNN where she has been described as CNN's "go to" for disasters. A frequent contributor to *The Atlantic*, she has a weekly security segment on NPR's Boston station WGBH. Her most recent book, *The Devil Never Sleeps: Learning to Live in an Age of Disasters*, was described in a *New Yorker* profile of her as an "engagingly urgent blueprint for rethinking our approach to disaster preparedness and response."

In government, she most recently served as President Obama's Assistant Secretary for Intergovernmental Affairs at the Department of Homeland Security. She is the recipient of many government honors, including the Distinguished Public Service Award, the Coast Guard's highest medal awarded to a civilian.

Professor Kayyem is the author or editor of six books, and in 2013, she was named the Pulitzer Prize finalist for editorial columns in *The Boston Globe* focused on ending the Pentagon's combat exclusion rule against women, a policy that was changed that year. She won the Telly Award in 2021 for "excellence in a digital series" for her online documentaries on climate change with MyRadar.com.

Serendipity! Talk

Judy Ikels, *Death in Wartime China, A Daughter's Discovery*Monday, October 3

On the 75th Anniversary of the end of WWII, I wanted to share the story of my father, William H. (Bill) Wallace, Jr, a B-24 pilot who sacrificed his life redeeming his entire crew in 1944. He served in the

China-Burma-India Theater with the Army Air Corps 308th Bombardment Group in the direct military lineage of the famed Flying Tigers. He died before I was born. I learned in 2015, somewhat by accident, a monument had been erected in 2006 to honor Bill and Chinese-American friendship near Kunming, China. In 2016, I made an emotional journey to visit the memorial. Death in Wartime China, A Daughter's Discovery weaves together firsthand accounts from an almost forgotten theater of war and a modern journey of re-connection and reflection.

Judy Ikels, a native Texan and graduate of the University of Texas majoring in English and Spanish, completed a 28-year Civil Service career with the Department of State in 2018. She had accompanied her late husband Larry Ikels on his 31-year career as a Foreign Service Officer with the US Information Agency serving in El Salvador, Colombia, Venezuela, Mexico, Brazil and Greece.

The story about her father's heroism and sacrifice in WWII lingered in the back of her mind all her life. But a serendipitous encounter in 2015 led her to a meaningful trip to China to see first-hand a memorial erected to honor her father and Chinese-American friendship. Family archives, letters, photos, and research taught her more.

Judy's unique story first appeared in the May, 2016 edition of State Magazine, the official publication of the Department of State, under the title "Discovering a Legacy." Death in Wartime China: A Daughter's Discovery is a heartfelt memoir that throws a spotlight on a little-known theater of WWII and the brave young Americans who served there. It is a reminder that family history shapes us in ways large and small.
