If you use some other edition, try to get one with foot- or endnotes.

## Goals:

We will read and discuss the last major work by what many critics feel is the greatest of the Victorian novelists. We will attempt not only to understand and enjoy this remarkable literary achievement, but also to consider its moral and psychological dimensions. We will look at author biographical material and the larger historical context of the book as well as its artistry and how it accomplishes its powerful effects.

# Format:

Study group meetings will be a mix of informal lectures with group discussions. Active participation by group members will be essential to the success of each meeting. Because the amount of reading will be heavy, the reading assignments will run a little over 100 pages a week. This is by no means impossible for intrepid OLLI participants, but it should be planned for.

<u>Sept. 27</u>—Discussion of DD, Book Two, "Meeting Streams" Chapter 11 through Book Three "Maidens Choosing" Chapter 19; Literary Realism; Epigraphs; GE's critical reputation

<u>Oct. 4</u>—Discussion of DD, Book Three "Maidens Choosing" through Chapter 27; publication practices; circulating libraries; journals

Oct. 11 — Discussion of DD, Book Four "Gwendolen Gets Her Choice" Chapter 28 through Chapter 31; narration and narrators

Oct. 18—Discussion of DD, Book Four "Gwendolen Gets Her Choice" Chapter 32 through Book Five "Mordecai" Chapter 40; coincidence; Zionism

<u>Oct. 25</u>—Discussion of DD, Book Six "Revelations" Chapter 41 through Chapter 49; Victorian religions; Evangelicalism; German Higher Criticism; Dissenters

<u>Nov.1</u>—Discussion of DD, Book Seven "The Mother and The Son" Chapter 50 through Book Eight "Fruit and Seed" Chapter 59; the woman question; vocation

<u>Nov 8</u>—Discussion DD, Book Eight "Fruit and Seed" Chapter 60 through Chapter 70; summing up; possible future courses; evaluations, etc.
