Note: These books are paperbacks. The Norton Critical Edition is highly recommended, as it comes with bottom-of-the-page footnotes and a large section of background, contexts, and criticism in the back. However, you should feel free to use other versions, should you care to. Any edition of

<u>A Christmas Carol</u> will be fine if it is a complete, uncut version (90-100 pages). We will be discussing <u>Great Expectations</u> first, so once you have your copy, you might want to get started on the reading ahead of time.

Goals:

We will read and discuss three masterworks from the 19th century, all of which deal with money in differing thematic ways: lack of it, hording it, and distortions of human relations caused by misuse of it. We will attempt not only to understand and enjoy these remarkable literary achievements, but also to consider the moral and psychological dimensions of each work. We will look at author biographical material and the larger historical context of these books, as well as their artistry and how they accomplish their powerful effects.

Format:

Study group meetings will be a mix of informal lectures with group discussions. Active participation by group members will be essential to the success of each meeting. Because the

amount of reading will be heavy, the reading assignments will run about 70-80 pages a week. This is by no means impossible for intrepid OLLI participants, but it should be planned for.

Schedule:

This part of the syllabus is subject to adjustment.

- <u>Mar. 14</u>—Discussion of <u>Great Expectations</u>, Chapter 12 (XII) through Chapter 22 (XXII); the Gothic novel; melodrama
- <u>Mar. 21</u>—Discussion of <u>Great Expectations</u>, Chapter 23 (XXIII) through Chapter 34 (XXXIV); narration and narrators
- Mar. 28 Discussion of <u>Great Expectations</u>, Chapter 35 (XXXV) through Chapter 46 (XLVI); Realism in literature; fairy tales; parables
- <u>Apr. 4</u>—Discussion of <u>Great Expectations</u>, Chapter 47 (XLVII) through Chapter 59 (LIX); background for A Christmas Carol; Utilitarianism
- Apr. 11—Discussion of A Christmas Carol all; Background for Silas Marner; Evangelicalism
- Apr.18—Discussion of Silas Marner, Chapter 1 through Chapter 12
- <u>Apr. 25</u>—Discussion of <u>Silas Marner</u>, Chapter 13 through Conclusion; summing up; possible future courses; evaluations, etc.
