Like Water for Chocolate (2)

MAIN CHARACTERS:

- Sisters: Rosaura, Gertrudis, Tita;
- Cook, maids: Nacha, Chencha;
- Pedro; Dr. John Brown; Alex Brown: son of John Brown;
- Older Esperanza: daughter of Rosaura and Pedro, wife of Alex Brown, niece of Tita;
- Young Esperanza: daughter of Esperanza, granddaughter of Rosaura, grandniece of Tita.

Like Water for Chocolate (3)

Synopsis:

Passionate Tita is in love with Pedro, but her controlling mother forbids her from marrying him. When Pedro marries her sister, Tita throws herself into her cooking -- and discovers she can transfer her emotions through the food she prepares.
