The Lunch Box (2)

Director: Ritesh Batra.

Setting: Mumbai, India.

MAIN CHARACTERS:

- Ila: young wife seeking her husband's attention by cooking delicious lunches for him;
- Saajan: older man who receives Ila's lunches by mistake;
- Shaikh: trainee at insurance company;
- Auntie: upstairs neighbor.

The Lunch Box (3)

Synopsis:

A mistaken delivery in Mumbai's famously efficient lunchbox delivery system connects a young housewife to an older man in the dusk of his life as they build a fantasy world together through notes in the lunchbox.
