### Green Book (2018)

#### Awards/recognition:

- Premiere at the <u>Toronto International Film</u>
   <u>Festival</u> on September 11, 2018, where it won the <u>People's Choice Award</u>. It grossed \$321 million worldwide.
- Won the <u>Academy Award</u> for <u>Best Picture</u>, <u>Best Original Screenplay</u>, and <u>Best Supporting Actor</u> (for Ali). It also won the <u>Producers Guild of America Award for Best Theatrical Motion Picture</u>, the <u>Golden Globe Award for Best Motion Picture</u> <u>Musical or Comedy</u>, and the <u>National Board of Review award for the best film of 2018</u>.

#### Green Book (2)

#### Awards/recognition (cont'd):

 Chosen as one of the top 10 films of the year by the <u>American Film Institute</u>. Ali also won the <u>Golden</u> <u>Globe</u>, <u>Screen Actors Guild</u>, and <u>BAFTA Awards</u> for Best Supporting Actor.

### Green Book (3)

### **Synopsis:**

Dr Don Shirley is a world-class African-American pianist, who is about to embark on a concert tour in the Deep South in 1962. In need of a driver and protection, Shirley recruits Tony Lip, a toughtalking bouncer from an Italian-American neighborhood in the Bronx. Despite their differences, the two men soon develop an unexpected bond while confronting racism and danger in an era of segregation.

#### Green Book (4)

**SETTING**: Bronx, NYC; America's 1962 segregated deep South.

#### **MAIN CHARACTERS:**

- Dr. Don Shirley: African American accomplished concert pianist;
- Tony Lip: Italian bouncer and Don's driver;
- Dolores: Tony's wife;
- Amit: Don's servant.

#### Green Book Themes (5)

- Direct opposites finding common ground;
- Isolation/Loneliness due to high achievement;
- Dialogue/words no longer common in conversation;
- Racial discrimination in America in 1962.

## Green Book (7)

- The tour takes them into the segregated South. Some argue that there is no institutionalized racism in America. Do you agree?
- Do the racial attitudes of the police differ?
- What do you know about sundown towns?
- The racism at the plantation and restaurant is less violent, but is it less institutionalized?

## Green Book (8)

- Tony and Don have difficult exchanges over racial identities. Where do they bring in ethnic identity?
- How do Tony and Don define their race? What markers of race do they use?
- Do you agree that Tony is blacker than Don?

## Green Book (9)

- In the clip with the plumbers in the kitchen, what racial attitudes do we see? How does ethnicity play in that scene?
- What does Tony mean when he says, "Do I look Irish?" Do you think the barmaid understands it the same way?
- Tony is a complex character. How does he reveal himself when he says, "[life] is complicated?

## Green Book (10)

- Don Shirley emphasizes class differences. How does Tony respond?
- Oleg says Don wants to change the world? Do you think he makes any progress on this trip?
- Do we see the world change in the last scene?
   Is this realistic?
- Is this film's approach to race naïve and romanticized? Why or why not?
- What else did this film get wrong? What did it get right?

## Green Book (11)

- Do you think that a well-to-do black artist could employ domestics that did not look like him in 1962 in America?
- Do Don's southern hosts respect his talents?
- How did Don help Tony change his attitudes about good citizenship?
- Which character(s) strike you as not racist in this film and why?
