I want to wish everyone a very happy and educational new semester (and New Year). We are set to have another wonderful semester with a record-breaking 92 classes. One of my favorite study groups this past fall was "New Media Landscape," a series of presentations

by AU School of Communication professors, which explained the mind-boggling array of media competing for our attention. They are coming back this spring. One of my wife's favorites was "The Dodgers and Brooklyn: A Horsehide Love Affair." For me, these two study groups represent the array of classes available at OLLI: from the legends of our youth to the current bombardment of information.

This January we will usher in a new registration process. While we still cannot guarantee that everyone will get her or his first choice of study groups, we can assure that fewer people will get shut out of their preferred choices, with the understanding that those who have taken the most popular courses during the previous two semesters may have to wait to take them again. You can include among your six preferences, several study groups that are offered on the same day and at the same time because the computer will not allow you to be assigned to a study group if the time conflicts with a study group that you have already been accepted to. We will demonstrate the new registration process and answer any questions at Temple Baptist Church on Monday, January 6th, from 10:00 to 11:30 am.

The Spring 2014 catalogs will mail on Jan. 3. Please look them over carefully. We have a wide range of subjects and a record number (92) of study groups. (OLLI continues to attract many new and knowledgeable SGLs, who are excited about leading groups of students who are eager to continue learning.)

DO YOU WANT TO TRY SOMETHING NEW?

There is a new way for you to expand your lifelong learning experience. OLLI is offering a four week on-line discussion group with Susan Willens as its Study Group Leader. There will be no charge for participating this

semester. This discussion group is an adaptation of the two regular study groups that Susan will be leading this semester. The four essays to be discussed online (one each week) are in the text, *The Best American Essays 2013*, by Robert Atwan and Cheryl Strayed, published by Houghton Mifflin.

Susan has posted introductory comments and questions concerning the first essay, "Night," by Alice Munro, on the OLLI discussion group website. If you wish to participate, you may register by emailing the OLLI office. Once your account is setup, you can access the online discussion group from the OLLI website under the STUDY GROUPS tab. You will then be able to post comments either in response to Susan's remarks, in response to other members' remarks or with your own thoughts related to the reading. Registered members may contribute whenever they wish during the time a new essay will be up for discussion and may be read throughout the semester.

Discussions for the four essays will follow the schedule below:

"Night" - March 3 - March 16

"Confessions of an Ex-Mormon" - March 17 - March 30

"Some Notes on Attunement" - March 31 - April 6

"Ghost Estates" - April 7 - 14

Susan will read and comment on the online conversation for each essay. No special equipment is needed, only a computer with internet access.

OLLI hopes that this online process will work well. It can be improved and expanded. Using this format, OLLI will be able to accommodate more members in discussion groups than the traditional classroom.

Thanks to John Bowen for this reminder: When e-mailing a group, don't put all the individual addresses in the "To" line. Instead, put them in the "Bcc" line, and only your own address in the "To" line.

I have registered for this course. I am interested in the essay as a means of passing along information. I hope you will also consider taking this course as we continue to extend new programs to OLLI members.

Danilo Trisi, The War on Poverty at 50: Large Positive Impact, But More Work Remains

Danilo Trisi will provide an assessment of poverty trends over the last 50 years, explaining the factors that have led to declines in poverty as well as the demographic and economic shifts that have kept poverty higher than it might otherwise have been. He also will discuss the role of the safety net in reducing poverty, the many challenges that remain, and policy areas where further progress can be made.

Danilo Trisi is a Research Analyst at the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, one of the nation's premier policy organizations working at the federal and state levels on fiscal policy and public programs that affect low- and moderate-income families and individuals.

The National Archives, which coordinates DC's National History Day program, is looking for skilled volunteers to help teachers involve students in National History Day during the 2014-15 school year.

As you may know, National History Day makes history come alive for students who discover the historical, cultural, and social experiences of the past. Students choose historical topics related to next year's theme --Leadership and Legacy -- and conduct extensive primary and secondary research through libraries, archives, museums, oral history interviews, and historic sites. After analyzing and interpreting their sources and drawing historically significant conclusions, students present their work in original papers, websites, exhibits, performances, or documentaries. In the spring students enter these products into competitions at local, state, and national levels where they are evaluated by professional historians and educators.

A general discussion of bulbs (species and varieties), site selection (acidity, moisture, drainage, and light), soil preparation (aeration, amendments, and fertilizer), and planting techniques will supplement a colorful slideshow presentation -- with an emphasis on bulbs that can be planted after this spring's last-freeze date.

I want to thank you all for making OLLI at AU such a great organization. It provides us with the opportunity to continue to learn and to meet people with fascinating life experiences. Now, I want you to ask yourself how you

can make OLLI at AU better. If you have an idea about what you can do, please feel free to let me know.

In the spirit of continuing education, here are some fascinating results from a survey of 3,000 OLLI members who attend OLLI programs at eight universities around the country:

- Approximately two-thirds of participants are women
- The largest group is ages 65-69, followed by ages 70-74
- More than half have completed a graduate program!!!
- Approximately 86% have completed college
- More than 60% of the age group 50-54 use an iPad or Facebook;
 usage decreases with age to 10% for age 90 and above
- More than 40% of those under age 55 have taken online courses;
 the percentage declines with age to 20% for age 90 and above
- Almost all of those under age 50 are working part-time or fulltime, or looking for work; the percentage still working or looking for work for ages 70-74 is more than 15%
- More than 20% of those ages 50-54 have relocated recently; over 40% of those over age 75 have relocated
- The most popular topic areas (in order of popularity) are --
 - 1. History
 - 2. Fine Arts
 - 3. Current Affairs
 - 4. Literature
 - 5. Religion and Philosophy
 - 6. Health and Wellness
 - 7. Technology
 - 8. Science and Math
 - 9. Crafts

Cool Poems for Hot Days!

It's BACK ... "Cool Poems for Hot Days!"

For the 3rd summer in a row, new and longtime OLLI poets will meet to read and to write poetry. We'll read selected poems from Billy Collins' 2010 *Poets Laureate Anthology*, and we'll write and share our original poems. To RSVP (or for more information), contact Ginny at ginnyvne@yahoo.com.

Aristotle's Poetics Online

To follow up on OLLI's successful pilot project for online discussions, led by Sue Willens, OLLI will offer a short (six weeks) discussion of Aristotle's *Poetics* in June and early July, to be led by Dave Palmeter.

The group will use the new Oxford World's Classics translation of *Poetics*, by Anthony Kenney, and will begin June 4 with a discussion of Plato's theory of drama and poetry, with which Aristotle disagreed. It will conclude with defenses of poetry by Sir Philip Sidney and Percy Bysshe Shelley, and an application of Aristotle to detective stories by Dorothy L. Sayers, author of the Lord Peter Wimsey mysteries.

Between Plato at the beginning and Sidney, Shelly, and Sayers at the end, the group will spend four weeks on this short, but important, work by one of the most powerful thinkers of all time -- the first work on dramatic and literary theory in the Western intellectual tradition.

The discussion method will follow that used by Sue Willens: once a week, Dave will post online a comment on the week's reading and some questions. Over the course of the ensuing week, participants will post their own comments and reply to the comments of others. The process will be repeated weekly:

June 4 Excerpts from Plato's Republic.

June 11 Poetics: The Various Kinds of Poetry

June 18 Poetics: The Nature of Tragedy

June 25 Poetics: Excellence in Tragedy

July 2 Poetics: Epic

July 9 Excerpts from the writings of Sidney, Shelley,

and Sayers.

Letter from the Chairman of the Board



The Waitlist

This September we'll be using our new lottery system for the second time. By virtually all accounts, it worked extremely well in its debut last spring.

As with any new system, it takes some getting used to. Some people have been confused about waitlists, especially when they had a class from a study group leader

in either of the two prior semesters and are put on the waitlist for that SGL's current class.

The crucial point is this: There is no disadvantage-absolutely none-to selecting as your first choice a class from an SGL you had in either of the two prior classes. You do not miss a turn in the lottery when you do this.

At the end of the registration process, the computer will assign members from the waitlist to the classes they chose on a space-available basis. Members who are moved from a waitlist into one of their higher choices are then dropped from their lowest ranking choice.

Bottom line: If you want to take another class from an SGL from whom you took a class in either of the prior two semesters, go ahead and make it your first choice. You have nothing to lose by doing so.

Letter from the Chair

When Fall registration began, I asked you to consider making a contribution to the OLLI Future Fund. The result has been gratifying. So far this semester, 310 donors have given a total of \$23,749 to the Fund -- an average of more than \$75 per donor. We are very grateful to all of those who have given.

Fundraising has become more intensive at OLLI in recent years as our needs have grown. We do not yet know what our costs will be when we move into the current American University Law School building, but we do know that they will be higher. Costs will be associated with moving our property, but these will be comparatively small. We also will incur costs with a much-needed upgrade to our audio/visual equipment. These will be more significant than the move itself. And there may be costs associated with remodeling, which could be even more significant.

In addition to these one-time costs, there will be the continuing cost of higher rent. This is where the Future Fund becomes vital. We hope to raise the Fund to a level at which a conservative annual distribution to OLLI's operating expenses will reduce, if not eliminate, the need for a significant increase in annual membership fees, without diminishing the principal.

As the end of the year approaches, we will again be asking those of you who have not yet contributed to consider a tax-exempt donation to OLLI. And we hope that those of you who have so generously given this year will be able to make an additional contribution before the year ends. You will, of course, be entitled to a tax deduction for your gift, but you will receive much more -- the satisfaction of knowing that you've done your part to insure your institute's future.

RISING INEQUALITY: A LONG-RUN AND GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE Led by Al Hirsch

Several past OLLI study groups have dealt with the recent extremes of economic inequality in the U.S. A French economist, Thomas Piketty, has recently come forth with a new (best-selling) work and a novel approach to the subject. The book is Capital in the Twenty-First Century. Piketty views income and wealth inequality in a long-run historical and a global context. He also peers ahead to inequality's (possible) future trajectory through the 21st century based on vast amounts of long

historical multi-country data and simple (i.e., comprehensible) theory. He proposes a global tax on wealth as a (partial) remedy. Because of the book's considerable length (577 pages), we will read and discuss selected portions of it over a period of 8 weeks.
