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AU Campus Plan

American University has recently completed its 2021 Campus Plan that will guide its growth for the next ten years. Among the many issues the Plan addresses are the numbers of students enrolled and staff employed; the development and renovation of academic, residential, and athletic buildings; landscaping and open space preservation; student housing and rules of conduct; and parking regulations.

The OLLI at AU Board of Directors has been tracking development of the Campus Plan for the past 18 months through participation on the Community Liaison Committee, established to foster communication between the University and community organizations in the surrounding community. University representatives made a full presentation of the proposed 2021 Campus Plan to OLLI members at our October Open House and the resulting Plan reflects extensive neighborhood engagement and consultation.

In response to a request from AU administrators, the OLLI Board of Directors has sent a letter of

support to the DC Zoning Commission, which is currently reviewing the proposed Plan. The OLLI at AU Board is proud of the strong relationship with American University that extends beyond that of landlord/tenant in the Spring Valley Building. As the Board notes in its letter of support, the University is "an intellectually vibrant, financially secure, and community engaged partner that redounds to the benefit of OLLI at AU."

Our AU colleagues have further requested that OLLI members who wish to do so express their support of the Plan before March 22. You can review the Plan and submit your letter via the online portal here.

The Paradox of Free Speech in America

Sanford J. Ungar, president emeritus of Goucher College, is director of the nonpartisan Free Speech Project at Georgetown University, which is documenting the status of free expression in education, government, and civil society in America, and also teaches undergraduate seminars there on Free

Speech. Ungar was director of the Voice of America for two years during the Clinton administration, and previously was dean of the School of Communication at American University. During his journalism career, he was a staff writer for *The Washington Post*, Washington editor of *The Atlantic*, managing editor of *Foreign Policy* magazine, and co-host of "All Things Considered" on NPR. He is the author or editor of six nonfiction books, including *The Papers & The Papers: An Account of the Legal and Political Battle over the Pentagon Papers*. Sanford Ungar earned an AB in Government magna cum laude from Harvard College and a master's degree in International History from the London School of Economics.

Silver, Sword, and St one: Three Crucibles in the Latin American Story Marie Arana

Marie Arana is the Literary Director of the Library of Congress. Her most recent book, *Silver, Sword, and Stone: Three Crucibles* in the Latin American Story explores three enduring themes have defined Latin America since pre-Columbian times: the foreign greed for its mineral riches, an ingrained propensity to violence, and the abiding power of religion. The book is available at Politics and Prose. Among her other books is the widely praised biography of Simón Bolívar, *Bolívar: American Liberator, and American Chica*, which described her bicultural childhood between North and South Americas. That book was a finalist for the National Book Award, the PEN-Memoir Award, and chosen best book of the year by several publications. Marie is the former editor in chief of "Book World" at *The Washington Post*.
